The Mice of May Street Mai tänava hiired



In short the summary is as follows: the main characters of the mice family include Mother, Farther, Grandmother and the kids Karl, Toomas, Laura, Harri, Silvia and Jane (at the end of the book three more sisters are born to them). In the same house also lives a friend of the mice kids - the hamster Edgar who in the family's absence gets out of his cage and meets with the mice kids. All kinds of exciting adventures happen to the mice: they go eating cheese in flats, playing with the children's toys and having fun in the Water Park and at the opening of an exhibition, etc, causing everywhere some excitement and mess. 

The set of 49 domino cards all contain two different objects of various shape, size and colour from familiar toys to abstract images like triangle etc. Playing with these cards teaches a kid to identify the geometrical similarities and differences of the objects and describe them using abstract terms.
